Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by The Board of the Department of Economic History on 2012-12-11 to be valid from 2013-01-01, spring semester 2013.

General Information

This is a master level course and is optional in the second year of the Master programme in Economic Demography. After consent of the programme director it may also be included in the Master programme in Economic Demography during the first year. The course is given as a tutorial.

Main field of studies

Economic History

Depth of study relative to the degree requirements

Learning outcomes

On a general level the student shall acquire advanced knowledge of demographic processes and their interactions with economic and societal factors relating to migration and integration. Specifically students will be able to:

Knowledge and understanding

- demonstrate a deeper knowledge of the demographic issues related to the theme of the course

Competence and skills

- individually discuss, in writing and in smaller groups, different theories and explanations of the issues studied
- perform a comprehensive analysis of a relevant issue related to the course theme and present the results of this analysis in oral or written form

Judgement and approach

- interpret empirical findings and relate these to various theoretical models

Course content

The course is designed as a tutorial where the student independently read the designated literature and discusses it with the instructor, and possibly with other students in the group. In addition the student works with written assignments given by the instructor.

Course design

Teaching takes place primarily through individual supervision and discussions between the instructor and a small group of students.

Assessment

Most of the course work comprises of the student's own work with readings and assignments.

The University views plagiarism very seriously, and will take disciplinary actions against students for any kind of attempted malpractice in examinations and assessments. The penalty that may be imposed for this, and other unfair practice in examinations or assessments, includes suspension from the University.

B	Very good	A very good result with regard to the above mentioned aspects.
B	Good	The result is of a good standard with regard to the above mentioned aspects and lives up to expectations.
D	Satisfactory	The result is of a satisfactory standard with regard to the above mentioned aspects and lives up to expectations.
E	Sufficient	The result satisfies the minimum requirements with regard to the above mentioned aspects, but not more.
U	Fail	The result does not meet the minimum requirements with regard to the above mentioned aspects.

Students who do not obtain grades A-E on their written class room exam will be offered opportunities to retake the exam in which case the student will be assessed according to regular procedure. In the case of home exams that are handed in after the set deadline the teacher can: a) hand out a new exam which will be assessed according to regular procedure, b) may penalize the student by handing out a lower grade on the assignment in question unless the student can demonstrate special

circumstances for the delay.
