ENGK03, English: Level 3 - B. A. Course, 30 credits Engelska: Kandidatkurs, 30 högskolepoäng First Cycle / Grundnivå

Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by The pro-dean for First-Cycle Studies at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology on 2019-11-27 and was last revised on 2023-09-14. The revised syllabus applies from 2023-09-14, autumn semester 2023.

General Information

The course is offered as a freestanding course. It can normally be included in a first or second cycle degree.

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, the students shall be able to

Knowledge and understanding

- depending on their choice of specialisation, provide a specialised account of either English literature or English linguistics
- provide a specialised account of a chosen area of study in English linguistics or literature
- provide a basic account of the theory of science and research methods focusing on key aspects of the study of linguistics or literature
- provide an account of current research issues in either English literature or English linguistics

Competence and skills

- carry out either a literary analysis with correct use of established literary concepts or (depending on the specialisation) a study of linguistic data using linguistic concepts and methods
- independently identify, formulate and solve linguistic or literary problems
- manage their time to complete assignments within predetermined time frames
- independently search for and use information on English linguistics or literature in libraries and databases
- discuss and present their own research and that of others in a way that is adapted to the situation and audience
- communicate in writing in correct and idiomatic academic English
- apply correct reference and citation techniques as they are applied in linguistic or literary texts
- use a rich and varied discourse in speech and writing that is adapted to the situation
- demonstate advanced command in speech and writing of words and phrases that are relevant to the genre and communicative situation

Judgement and approach

- identify and assess the explicit and implicit statements on class, gender and ethnicity in a text
- identify their need of further knowledge to improve their skills in English
- critically review and assess different types of sources

Course content

The student chooses to specialise in either linguistics or literature in their studies. In their respective specialisations, literature or language are studied from, for the student, new perspectives and modes of interpretation. In addition, the student will select an area for specialised study in English linguistics or literature. Both oral and written proficiency are practised, but at this level practice in proficiency is subordinated to, and incorporated in, academic work. These skills and knowledge are applied in a degree project in which the students consolidate their ability to use English in speech and writing. The learning of new vocabulary is seen as an ongoing process, carried out, primarily, as self-study.

The course consists of the following modules:

- 1. Elective Course in English, 7.5 credits
- 2. English Linguistics: Theory and Method 7.5 credits, *or* English Literature: Theory and Method, 7.5 credits
- 3. Degree Project, 15 credits.

The elective course is chosen from a selection of courses in either linguistics or literature. A list of elective courses is approved for each semester, published on the course website and hard copies available from the director of studies or equivalent.

Course design

Teaching consists of group work, lectures and seminars, and in the form of individual supervision of the degree project. Supervision is normally limited to the semester when the student was first registered on the course. Exceptions can be made if there are special grounds.

The assessment is based on

- 1. English: Elective Course (7.5 credits): Assessment occurs in accordance with the respective course description in the documentation that is provided at the beginning of the semester (for example, a written examination, written assignments such as take-home exams, an essay, a response paper or a learning journal, oral presentations and compulsory assessed seminars. Assessment can also be based on the performance of a play.
- 2. English Linguistics: Theory and Method (7.5 credits): Final written assignment and 1-2 minor written or oral assignments. The final written assignment is worth the most.
 - English literature: Theory and Method (7.5 credits): Written final examination.
- 3. Degree Project (15 credits): an individual degree project presented in the form of an academic paper. The degree project is to be discussed and defended at a final seminar. This final seminar constitutes a necessary part of the assessment of the degree project.

Passed degree projects at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology can be registered in the LUP Student Papers database if the student so wishes. In this case, the student is responsible for ensuring that the version of the degree project that has been assessed and approved is the one uploaded to LUP Student Papers (in PDF format).

The examiner, in consultation with Disability Support Services, may deviate from the regular form of examination in order to provide a permanently disabled student with a form of examination equivalent to that of a student without a disability.

Grades

Marking scale: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction.

To be awarded a grade of Pass on the whole course, the student must have been awarded this grade on all modules. To be awarded a grade of Pass with Distinction on the whole course, the student must also have been awarded this grade on 22.5 credits.

Entry requirements

To be admitted to the course, the student must have completed ENGA22 or have acquired equivalent knowledge.
