Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by The pro-dean for First-Cycle Studies at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology on 2014-12-30 to be valid from 2015-01-19, spring semester 2015.

General Information

The course is offered as a freestanding course.

It can be selected as a specialisation course in the Bachelor's programme in Religious Studies and Theology.

It can be included in a first or second cycle degree.

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, the students shall be able to

Knowledge and understanding

• account for the historical emergence and the characteristic features of the major branches within modern religious Judaism and secular Judaism

• account for the differences between religious and secular Judaism

Competence and skills

- read and describe the line of thought in theological Jewish texts
- critically analyse and discuss online texts linked to different religious and secular Jewish groups
- identify a given text as belonging to one of the major branches of modern Judaism.

Judgement and approach

• critically assess statements and ideas of continuity and upheaval in the meeting between Jewish tradition and modernity

Course content

The course deals with different religious and secular forms of modern Judaism as they are manifested specifically in present-day USA, Israel and Sweden. The historical emergence of the different religious and secular branches is highlighted as a background, but the emphasis of the course is placed on the modern modes of expression of the different forms of Judaism and shifting religious/ideological positions. The aim is to highlight the diversity of Judaism, illustrated partly by the religious/ideological contents of different web pages linked to different movements and partly by a selection of short theological texts which will familiarise the student with different formulations of modern Jewish theological thought.

Course design

The course is mainly a distance learning course supported by a learning management system and digital tools. The student is required to participate on these conditions and have access to a computer with Internet connection. Information regarding technical requirements is available from the department

The teaching consists of online lectures and active participation in a shared course blog.

Assessment

The assessment is partly continuous and based on at least ten analytical blog posts on set texts/assignments and twenty comments on others' posts, and partly on a final take-home exam.

Grades

Marking scale: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction.

Entry requirements

To be admitted to the course, the student must meet the general entry requirements and have passed Jewish History and Culture (JUDA21/JUDD21) or 30 credits from higher education.
