LINA13, Linguistics: Level 1, 30 credits Lingvistik: Grundkurs, 30 högskolepoäng First Cycle / Grundnivå

Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by The pro-dean for First-Cycle Studies at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology on 2011-09-28 to be valid from 2011-09-28, spring semester 2012.

General Information

The course is offered as a free-standing course. It can normally be included in a firstor second-cycle degree.

Language of instruction: English and Swedish

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course the student shall

Knowledge and understanding

- be able to use fundamental linguistic concepts and explain their meaning
- be able give a fundamental account of language analysis
- be able to explain how speech sounds are produced and understood, and how acoustic sound waves are structured
- be able to give an account of the ways in which diverse language families express various types of lexical and grammatical meaning.

Competence and skills

- be able to give an oral and written account of a chosen topic within the discipline of Linguistics
- be able to conduct simple phonetic experiments in a laboratory and give an account of their relevance
- demonstrate a basic ability to analyse the various levels of language: phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics, and pragmatics.
- be able to analyse various examples of the relationship between vocabulary, grammar and different types of semantic content.

Judgement and approach

- be able to discuss the interplay between language and society and how this affects language norms and status
- be able to analyse linguistic phenomena from different perspectives, such as gender and ethnicity.

Course content

The course introduces the discipline of Linguistics and its sub- categories General Linguistics and Phonetics. The student learns to orient him/herself within the discipline, define and use its terminology and in general be knowledgeable of the issues relevant to research in linguistics. In addition students select two subjects for specialised study: language acquisition, the different types and families of languages in the world, the interplay between language and thought or the interplay between man, language and society.

The course consists of the following modules:

- 1. The Structure and Function of Language, 7.5 credits,
- 2. Spoken Communication the Basis of Phonetics, 7.5 credits,
- 3. Elective Course, 7.5 credits,
- 4. Elective Course, 7.5 credits.

Students may choose from the following for the elective courses (please note that not all modules are offered every semester):

- The Languages of the World, 7.5 credits,
- Language, Communication and Thought, 7.5 credits,
- Language Learning in Children and Adults, 7.5 credits,
- Man, Language and Society, 7.5 credits.

Course design

Teaching consists of lectures, group work, individual assignments and compulsory laboratory exercises.

Assessment

Module 1 is examined through a written exam and a written and oral presentation of an individual minor research assignment.

Module 2 is examined through a written exam.

Modules 3 and 4 are examined in the following ways:

- The Languages of the World: a written and oral presentation of a home assignment (individually or in groups) and a take-home exam.
- Language, Communication and Thought: a combination of continuous assignments presented in class and a written report of a course assignment.
- Language Learning in Children and Adults: analysis in groups of transcriptions of children's language production at various ages and a take-home exam.
- Man, Language and Society: continuous assignments in lectures and a written exam.

Subcourses that are part of this course can be found in an appendix at the end of this document.

Grades

Marking scale: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction.

For a grade of Pass on the whole course, students must have achieved the grade of Pass on all modules. For a grade of Pass with Distinction on the whole course students must have achieved the grade of Pass with Distinction on 22.5 of the credits awarded for the course and a grade of Pass on the remaining credits.
