LINB13, Linguistics: Diversity of the World's Languages, 7.5 credits

Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by the programmes director by delegation from the prodean for first- and second-cycle studies on 2013-06-17 to be valid from 2013-06-17, autumn semester 2013.

General Information

The course is offered as a freestanding course. It can normally be included as part of a general first- or second-cycle degree.

Language of instruction: English

The course can be taught in Swedish if an agreement is reached by both the lecturer and the students. Such an agreement would depend on both the lecturer and the students having a good knowledge of Swedish.

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course the student shall

Knowledge and understanding

- be able to give an account of the main language families of the world, where they are found and their typical features
- be able to explain the significance of language relatedness, what it is and how it can be recognised.

Competence and skills

- be able to explain and apply the fundamental principles of language typology
- be able to distinguish between possible/probable languages and impossible/improbable languages
- be able to derive linguistic data from work with informants
- be able to make grammatical generalisations based on isolated examples of language
- be able to localise a language in the world (geographically or genealogically) on a basis of facts relating to structure and the sociology of language.

Judgement and approach

• be able to discuss and reflect on his/her own native language in a global context.

Course content

The course provides an overview of the languages of the world, to which families they belong and where they are spoken. It covers elements that are common to all human languages and in what manner languages may differ from each other, for example, in grammar and sound systems. Similarities between languages are also discussed, which can be a result of being genealogically related, of borrowing from another language or because of universals that are linked to how languages work as a means of human communication. A central element in the course is a group work assignment which involves examining the structure of a language the student is not previously acquainted with, using primarily the student's own informants.

Course design

Teaching consists of lectures and compulsory group work.

Assessment

The assessment is based on a written and oral report of a home assignment (individual or in groups) and a take-home exam.

Grades

Marking scale: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction.

Entry requirements

To be admitted to the course students must have passed LINB02 Linguistics: The Structure and Function of Language or 60 credits in a language subject, or the equivalent.

- 2. This course is also a module in Linguistics, Level 1: LINA13. The credits can only be accredited once in a degree.
