On completion of the course, students shall be able to

Knowledge and understanding

- provide a specialised account of key works on human rights as a philosophical concept and political practice in the modern era
- account for different orientations in current research about the historiography of human rights
- account for present-day implications of the historiography of human rights on politics and research, and for key concepts in the field and their applicability

Competence and skills

- argue and account for their assessment of complex issues in speech and writing
- communicate the results of their own work and that of others

Judgement and approach

- critically and independently reflect on key theories and concepts in the field
- provide scholarly analyses and assessments of information

Course content

The course adopts a critical and analytical perspective on the political and philosophical historiography of human rights in the modern era. A particular focus is placed on tendencies and groupings within current research, but also on the study of key original works. The course provides students with a detailed presentation of typical features of political and philosophical theories and conceptualisations of human rights and on ideas about the place and role of human rights in political and philosophical history. It explores debates about the legitimisation and justification of human rights as well as criticism directed at them.

Course design

The teaching consists of lectures, compulsory seminars and student-led workshops and debating clubs. Absence from a compulsory seminar is to be compensated for by an assignment in accordance with the instructions of the course director.

Assessment

The assessment of the course is based on weekly written assignments and 1-2 oral presentations.

The examiner, in consultation with Disability Support Services, may deviate from the regular form of examination in order to provide a permanently disabled student with a form of examination equivalent to that of a student without a disability.

Grades

Marking scale: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction.

Entry requirements

To be admitted to the course, students must have a first cycle degree in a humanities or social sciences subject including a degree project focusing on human rights, and English B from Swedish upper secondary school or the equivalent.
