TLVR41, Studies in Faith and World Views: Ethics - Second Cycle Course II, 15 credits

Tros- och livsåskådningsvetenskap: Etik - avancerad kurs II, 15 högskolepoäng Second Cycle / Avancerad nivå

Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by the programmes director by delegation from the prodean for first- and second-cycle studies on 2014-08-14 to be valid from 2014-09-01, autumn semester 2014.

General Information

The course is offered as a freestanding course. It is included as an elective component in the Master's programme in Religious Studies and Theology specialising in Studies in Faith and World Views. The course can be included in a first or second cycle degree.

Language of instruction: English

The course is normally taught in English, but can also be taught in Swedish, provided there is a special agreement between the lecturer/s and the students.

Main field of studies

Religious Studies and Theology with specialization in Studies in Faiths and World Views

Depth of study relative to the degree requirements

A1F, Second cycle, has second-cycle course/s as entry requirements

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, the students shall be able to

Knowledge and understanding

- independently and critically account for and provide examples of theories and arguments within religious studies
- independently give a detailed description of a couple of fields within philosophical and theological ethics, e. g. bioethics, animal ethics, feminist ethics, environmental ethics, sexual ethics and healthcare ethics

Competence and skills

- manage large volumes of data for selected areas within ethics and compile these into a unified synopsis that can be presented accessibly in speech and writing
- independently formulate individual positions on complex phenomena and contexts within ethics
- use different perspectives- of class, gender, ethnicity, intersectionality- to provide a nuanced analysis and review of theories of ethics
- present analyses, critiques and proposals for solutions to ethical issues in speech and writing to both a national and international target groups
- participate constructively in discussions of advanced issues within religious studies

Judgement and approach

- take a critical position in both speech and writing to both their own and others' arguments, conclusions and views within ethics
- critically review and assess the role of ethics in the scholarly and public debate and actively participate in it
- take responsibility for their own knowledge development through self-critical assessment and active acquisition of knowledge

Course content

Informed by previously acquired knowledge, the student, in consultation with the lecturer, selects two areas within ethics for specialised study. The areas available for selection are:

- 1) Women, men and sexuality.
- 2) Animals and the environment
- 3) War, peace and justice
- 4) Good and evil

5) Theological ethics

6) Ethics and aesthetics

The course consists of the following modules:

- 1. Elective specialisation 1, 7.5 credits
- 2. Elective specialisation 2, 7.5 credits

Course design

The course mainly consists of independent text study. Teaching is provided in the form of an introductory planning session and supervisory follow-up.

After consultation with the student, the lecturer approves an individual reading list.

Assessment

Modules 1 and 2 are both assessed on the basis of oral and written presentations. At least one of the presentations on one of the modules should address a target group of international scholars in the form of, for example, a notice for a research journal, a conference paper or a research article.

Grades

Marking scale: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction. The grades awarded are Fail, Pass or Pass with Distinction.,

For a grade of Pass on the whole course, the student must have been awarded this grade on both modules. For a grade of Pass with Distinction on the whole course, the student must have been awarded this grade on both modules.

Entry requirements

To be admitted to the course, the student must have a Bachelor's degree and passed the following course: Studies in Faith and World Views: Second Cycle Course I, 15 credits (TLVR12 or TLVR11) or the equivalent.
