Details of approval

General Information

The course is offered as a freestanding course in the context of the contract education Social Innovation in a Digital Context. It can normally be included in first or second cycle degree.

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, the students shall be able to

Knowledge and understanding

- account for and use normative concepts in communication with regard to social change management
- account for the complexity that leads to "wicked problems" in social and digital contexts from the perspective of the specific contexts of their own and others' projects
- provide a basic account or how digital technology changes the preconditions and the scope for action of different users and stakeholders in society and organisations

• account for methods and approaches in the area of participatory design

Competence and skills

- in speech and writing discuss norms in relation to social innovation and contemporary digital media on the basis of selected examples
- use normative concepts to analyse their own and others'social development and innovation projects
- apply methods and approaches from value-based participatory design in social change projects
- identify "wicked problems" on the basis of the specific context of their own and others' social development and innovation projects
- informed by approaches and methods of value-based participation, formulate solutions or strategies to mitigate identified "wicked problems"

Judgement and approach

- identify and justify the choice of a value-based participatory method to involve users in a change project
- critically reflect on wicked problems in relation to their own and others' projects on the basis of the specific contexts

Course content

The course focuses on the methods for and the importance of the participants' involvement in the design and development work for social innovation. It highlights the historical development in change management in which digital technology has triggered and enabled hidden and open agendas. The interplay between laws, norms and other influential structures in society is also highlighted in relationship to participatory design. The course provides participants with a historical background and theories of norms. "Wicked problems" are a natural but recalcitrant result of including many stakeholders with different perspectives and points of departure in a process of change. The course also addresses how these "wicked problems" can be handled and integrated in social innovation together with soft human values.

Course design

The teaching consists of lectures, seminars, scheduled group exercises. Participation in 5-8 seminars and group exercises is compulsory.

The course is offered partially as a distance learning course and makes use of an online learning platform and/or digital tools. Students are expected to participate on these conditions and to have access to a computer with internet connection. The department provides information about the technical requirements.

The introduction or conclusion of the course includes a compulsory component requiring face to face meetings.

Assessment

The assessment is based on ongoing assignments and a project presentation.

Grades

Marking scale: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction.

Entry requirements

To be admitted to the course, participants must have a Bachelor's degree.
