Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by the programmes director by delegation from the pro-dean for first- and second-cycle studies on 2007-02-28 to be valid from 2007-02-28, autumn semester 2007.

General Information

Subject: Historical Archaeology

The course is offered as a single course. It can normally be included as part of a general degree at the undergraduate and graduate levels. With the approval of the relevant authenticating body, it can also be included in other educational programmes.

Language of instruction: Swedish

Main field of studies

Historical Archaeology

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course the student shall

Knowledge and understanding

- be able to account for different perspectives on and working methods for the examination and interpretation of historic buildings
- be able to account for the demands for and attitudes to the preservation of cultural environments with regard to historic buildings in particular

Competence and skills

- be able to apply basic methods in the archaeology of buildings
- be able to design studies of and reports on issues in the archaeology of buildings
- be able to evaluate and discuss various interpretations of problems in the archaeology of buildings

Judgement and approach

- be able, from a variety of perspectives, to discuss and have an opinion on buildings in relation to their value in terms of cultural heritage and scholarly potential.

Course content

Using a specific building as an example, the students will gain practice in and theoretical experience of antiquarian issues and issues relating the archaeology of buildings. A number of elements are treated using the chosen building as an example, i.e. buildings in research and conservation within cultural heritage, building materials and design, documentation and analysis, investigation and examination. The emphasis is on the applied documentation of a building, which means that, to a large extent, the various elements of the course are integrated with each other and are held in proximity to the object of study.

Course design

Teaching consists of lectures, seminars, group work and field studies. Excursions are also possible. Seminars, excursions, group work and field studies are obligatory.

Assessment

Examinations can be both oral and written.

Subcourses that are part of this course can be found in an appendix at the end of this document.

Grades

Marking scale: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction.

Entry requirements

To be eligible for the course requires undergraduate studies in one of a range of subjects i.e. at least 60 credits in Classical Archaeology and Ancient History, Archaeology, Historical Archaeology, Art History, Ethnology or Conservation, or undergraduate studies in Architecture, 80 credits, or the equivalent of these.
