COSB40, Asian Studies: Contemporary South-East Asia -Political Developments and Societal Issues, 7.5 credits Asienstudier: Dagens Sydöstasien - Politisk utveckling och samhällsfrågor, 7,5 högskolepoäng First Cycle / Grundnivå

Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by The pro-dean for First-Cycle Studies at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology on 2020-12-22 to be valid from 2020-12-22, autumn semester 2021.

General Information

The course is offered as a freestanding course. It can normally be included in a first or second cycle degree.

Language of instruction: English

Main field of studies

Asian Studies

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, the students shall be able to

Knowledge and understanding

- account for contemporary political developments in Southeast Asia
- account for the developments in different social and political areas such as digital media, civil societies and social movements, human rights, environment and land right issues

Competence and skills

• identify and analyse how different issues and problems are related and affect each other

- critically discuss and analyse different conceptions of developments in Southeast Asian societies
- from a global perspective identify and analyse current issues in contemporary Southeast Asian societies
- collect, evaluate, and use relevant sources as a basis for a written analysis of a specific issue concerning Southeast Asian societies

Judgement and approach

• analyse and critically assess current issues in Southeast Asian societies

Course content

The course provides students with basic knowledge of Southeast Asian political systems and contemporary political developments. It analyses a number of key issues and challenges that characterise contemporary Southeast Asian societies. It includes issues of democracy, the development of authoritarian rule and authoritarian innovation, and populism. The role of the media and digital developments are studied in the course. The course also focuses on the role played by Southeast Asian civil societies and social movements, and on the human rights situation. Environmental issues and land rights issues are also addressed. Domestic issues are also studied from a global perspective.

Course design

The course is offered as a distance learning course with the support of a web-based learning platform and/or digital tools. Students are required to participate under these conditions, and to have access to a computer with an Internet connection. The teaching consists of online lectures, seminars and discussions, as well as film screenings.

Assessment

The assessment is based on a seminar paper (3 credits) and a written home exam (4.5 credits).

The course includes opportunities for assessment at a first examination, a re-sit close to the first examination and a second re-sit for courses completed in the past year (catch-up exam).

The examiner, in consultation with Disability Support Services, may deviate from the regular form of examination in order to provide a permanently disabled student with a form of examination equivalent to that of a student without a disability.

Subcourses that are part of this course can be found in an appendix at the end of this document.

Grades

Marking scale: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction.

The grade for a non-passing result is Fail. For the grade of Pass on the entire course, the student must have been awarded at least a Pass on all assessed credits. For the

grade Pass with Distinction the student must have been awarded Pass with Distinction on more than 50 percent of the credits.

At the start of the course students are informed about the learning outcomes stated in the syllabus and about the grading scale and how it is applied in the course.

Entry requirements

General entry requirements and at least 30 higher education credits.

Oral and written proficiency in English equivalent to English 6 from Swedish upper secondary school is a requirement.

A general exemption from the requirement of proficiency in Swedish is applied.
