COSM01, Asian Studies: Introduction to Asian Studies, 6 credits

Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by The pro-dean for First-Cycle Studies at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology on 2022-11-01 to be valid from 2023-03-15, autumn semester 2023.

General Information

The course is given as a compulsory course and begins the first semester of the Master of Science Programme (120 credits) in Asian Studies. It is also given as a freestanding course.

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, the students shall be able to

Knowledge and understanding

- account for the interdisciplinary field of Asian Studies
- account for how the knowledge base in the field of studies, in general and in Asian Studies in particular, is changeable and questioned
- account for the conventions of academic writing
- describe central questions and discussions that concern research ethics and academic freedom at a general level

Competence and skills

- discuss knowledge of East and South-East Asia and relate it to Asian Studies

This is a translation of the course syllabus approved in Swedish

- produce a simple academic text with a clear outline, suitable language and correct references.

Judgement and approach

- critically and autonomously present analytical arguments, orally and in writing
- apply a critical perspective conduct research on present-day East and South-East Asia

Course content

The course provides a critical, comparative and interdisciplinary introduction to studies of East and South-East Asia's societies. The course provides an overview of Asian Studies using central concepts and approaches in social sciences and the humanities, and deepens the study of East and South-East Asia's societies by emphasising the shifting contexts and content of knowledge in this field. A critical perspective is applied. Western knowledge formation about East and South-East Asia. Furthermore, new theories and approaches that have arisen through the study of East and South-East Asia's societies, e.g. theories of post-colonialism that have been questioned and enriched Western social sciences, are discussed and analysed. The course takes a gender perspective on today's societies in East and South-East Asia that creates awareness about issues concerning gender, power and representativeness. The course provides an introduction to academic writing and the opportunity to apply this knowledge in short written works. Furthermore, the students practise critical thinking and deliberative discussions in discussing research ethics and academic freedom and their importance for knowledge development.

Course design

The teaching consists of lectures, film showings and two to four seminars.

Participation in seminars is compulsory.

Absence from compulsory seminars can be compensated for by an assignment in accordance with instructions from the course director.

Assessment

The course is assessed through an individual seminar assignment (2 credits graded U/G) and an individual home exam (4 credits graded A-F).

The course offers a regular examination, a re-sit in close connection to the regular examination and another re-sit for courses that have been completed during the past academic year (catch-up examination).

If it is necessary for a student with a permanent disability to be given an equivalent examination option compared to a student without a disability, the examiner can, after consultation with the university's department for pedagogical support, decide on an alternative form of examination for the student concerned.

The examiner, in consultation with Disability Support Services, may deviate from the regular form of examination in order to provide a permanently disabled student with a form of examination equivalent to that of a student without a disability.

Grades

Marking scale: Fail, E, D, C, B, A.

The highest grade is A and the lowest passing grade is E. The grade for a non-passing result is Fail.

The grade for the entire course consists of a weighted average of all components assessed with differentiated pass grades (in which A=5, B=4, C=3, D=2; and E=1). For a grade of Pass (at least E) on the entire course, the student must have been awarded at least a Pass (E or, for components awarded Pass or Fail, Pass) on all assessed components and have participated in all compulsory components.

At the start of the course, students are informed about the learning outcomes stated in the syllabus and about the grading scale and how it is applied in the course.

Entry requirements

For admission to the course, the student is required to have a Degree of Bachelor in social sciences or humanities.

Oral and written proficiency in English equivalent to English 6/B from Swedish upper secondary school is a requirement. International qualifications will be assessed in accordance with national guidelines.

A general exemption from the requirement of proficiency in Swedish is applied.
