Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by the programmes director by delegation from the prodean for first- and second-cycle studies on 2013-01-07 and was last revised on 2017-10-20 by The pro-dean for First-Cycle Studies at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology. The revised syllabus comes into effect 2017-10-20 and is valid from the spring semester 2018.

General information

The course is a compulsory component of the Bachelor of Arts programme in Digital Cultures.

Language of instruction: Swedish

Teaching in other Scandinavian languages or in English may occur.

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, the students shall be able to

Knowledge and understanding

 provide a specialised account of scholarly theories and methodology that are key to the field of digital cultures and their area of specialisation for the degree project account for current research issues in the field of digital cultures

Competence and skills

- independently identify, formulate and solve a problem within predetermined timeframes in the field of digital cultures
- seek, collect, assess, synthesise and critically interpret material of relevance to the issue selected for the degree project
- informed by a thoroughly supported theoretical understanding, identify and use theories and methods appropriate to the area for the degree project in digital cultures
- independently present and report the results in writing and defend the degree project orally
- communicate their expertise and ideas in the field of digital cultures in advanced contexts

Judgement and approach

- critically reflect on the topic of the degree project and its role in relation to wider society informed by ethical, societal and disciplinary issues
- identify their need of further knowledge and develop their expertise within digital cultures.

Course content

The course is included in semester 6 of the Bachelor's programme. During the course, students are to execute a degree project in digital cultures individually or in pairs. The degree project is to result in a written academic paper, equivalent to a Bachelor's thesis It is to demonstrate the student's ability to execute a research project from problem formulation to completed analysis within a predetermined time frame. The course consists of the student's production of a degree project in the form of a Bachelor's thesis in the field of digital cultures. The students are to choose a topic based on their previous studies in consultation with the supervisor. The seminars of the course deal with the form and content of the degree project, academic and scholarly writing, and issues of method.

Course design

The teaching consists of lectures, seminars and supervision. Participation is compulsory in the final seminar in which the degree projects are discussed.

Supervision is normally limited to the semester that the student was first registered in the course. Exceptions can be made if there are special grounds.

Assessment

The assessment is based on the student's production and defence of a degree project executed individually or in pairs, and critical review of another degree project individually or in pairs.

Passed degree projects at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology can be registered in the LUP Student Papers database if the student so wishes. The student is responsible for uploading the passed degree project as a PDF file in LUP student papers.

The examiner, in consultation with the Disability Support Service, may deviate from the regular form of examination in order to provide a permanently disabled student with a form of examination equivalent to that of a student without a disability.

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Grades

Grading scale includes the grades: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction

Entry requirements

To be admitted to the course, students must have passed- Digital Cultures: Theories-Introduction (DIKA11), - Digital Cultures: Theories: Continuation (DIKA21), - Digital Cultures: Project Work 1 (DIKA10), - Digital Cultures: Project Work 2 (DIKA20) and-Digital Cultures: Project Work 3 (DIKA30), - Digital Cultures: Research Methods (DIKA64), and at least another 30 credits within the programme, or the equivalent.
