## ENGG10, English: Elective Course, 7.5 credits

*Engelska: Valbar kurs, 7,5 högskolepoäng*

First Cycle / Grundnivå

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### Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by The pro-dean for First-Cycle Studies at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology on 2021-09-09 to be valid from 2021-09-09, spring semester 2022.

### General Information

The course is part of the Bachelor of Arts programme in English Studies, semester 6. It can normally be included in a first or second cycle degree.

### Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, the students shall be able to:

#### Knowledge and understanding

- provide a specialised account of a chosen area of study in English linguistics or literature
- at a basic level, relate the chosen area to the larger context of the area of study (English linguistics or literature)

#### Competence and skills

- demonstrate the ability to search, collect, evaluate and critically interpret relevant information
- discuss, analyse and question relevant course material in speech and in writing in correct and idiomatic academic English

- apply correct reference and citation techniques as they are applied in linguistic or literary texts

### **Judgement and approach**

- identify their need of further knowledge to improve their skills in English
- critically review and assess different types of sources

### **Course content**

Students are able to specialise in a chosen area of English language or literature. The elective courses are developed by lecturers/researchers in English at Lund University and often have a close connection to areas, phenomena or methods which they are interested in themselves through their research.

### **Course design**

At the beginning of the semester, a number (2-4) of elective courses are presented both in speech and in writing. The students on the course and on other courses with equivalent elective components choose from these courses as well as ranking them. Students are then allocated to the elective courses based on the students' choices and rankings. When necessary, for example if one of the elective courses is overly popular, the students' academic qualifications in English (the number of credits and the number of grades of Pass with Distinction) will determine which students are awarded their first choice. In exceptional cases, one of the offered elective courses may be cancelled, for example, if the applicants per place is too low.

The teaching primarily consists of seminars or the equivalent during which the course material is discussed and analysed and different methods and theories are practised and concretised. However, naturally, there is variation among the different elective courses so it is difficult to provide more concise information. Courses that conclude with the performance of a play also include rehearsals of different kinds.

### **Assessment**

Different forms of assessment apply depending on the specifics of the individual course, for example, written examinations, written assignments as take-home exams, academic papers, response papers and learning journals, oral presentations and compulsory assessed seminars. The assessment can also be based on the performance of a play.

The examiner, in consultation with Disability Support Services, may deviate from the regular form of examination in order to provide a permanently disabled student with a form of examination equivalent to that of a student without a disability.

### **Grades**

Marking scale: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction.

## **Entry requirements**

To be admitted to the course, students must have successfully completed 125 credits in the Bachelor of Arts programme in English Studies at Lund University (or the equivalent), of which at least 75 credits must be in English.

1. The course is offered at the Centre for Languages and Literature, Lund University.
2. The course is studied together with the Elective Course in ENKG03 and ENGH15.
3. The credits allocated for course content that in whole or in part is commensurate with another course can only be credited once for a degree.
