

ENGH15, English: Level 3 - B. A. Course (61-75), 15 credits

Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by The pro-dean for First-Cycle Studies at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology on 2019-12-02 and was last revised on 2023-09-12 (U 2023/672). The revised syllabus comes into effect 2023-09-13 and is valid from the spring semester 2024.

General information

The course is offered as a freestanding course. It can normally be included in a general qualification for both first and second-cycle studies.

Language of instruction: English

Main field of study *Specialisation*

English G2F, First cycle, has at least 60 credits in first-cycle course/s as entry requirements

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, the students shall be able to:

Knowledge and understanding

- depending on their choice of specialisation, provide a specialised account of either English literature or English linguistics
- provide a specialised account of an elective field within English language or English literature
- provide a basic account of theories and research methods focusing on key aspects of the study of linguistics or literature
- account for current research issues in either English linguistics or English literature

Competence and skills

- use language that is adapted to the situation with words and phrases of relevance to the genre and communication situation, both orally and in writing

Course content

The student chooses to specialise in either linguistics or literature. In their respective specialisations, literature and language are studied from, for the student, new perspectives and modes of interpretation. In addition, the student will select an area for specialised study in English literature or linguistics. Both oral and written proficiency are practised, but at this level practice in proficiency is subordinated to, and incorporated into, academic work. The learning of new vocabulary is seen as an ongoing process, carried out, primarily, as self-study.

The course consists of the following modules:

1. English Literature: Theory and Method, 7.5 credits
or English Linguistics: Theory and Method (7.5 credits)
2. Elective Course, (7.5 credits).

The elective course is chosen from a selection of courses in either linguistics or literature. The list of elective courses is approved each semester and is published on the course website and available through the director of studies or equivalent.

Course design

The teaching consists of group exercises, lectures and seminars.

Assessment

The assessment is based on

Module 1

English Literature: Theory and Method (7.5 credits): Written final examination.

English Linguistics: Theory and Method (7.5 credits): Final written assignment and 1-2 minor written or oral assignments. The final written assignment is worth the most.

Module 2

English: Elective Course (7.5 credits): The assessment is based on different forms depending on the nature of the individual course, e.g. written exam, written assignments such as take-home exams, essays, "response papers" and "learning journals", oral presentations and compulsory assessed seminars. The assessment can also be based on the performance of a play.

The examiner, in consultation with Disability Support Services, may deviate from the regular form of examination in order to provide a permanently disabled student with a form of examination equivalent to that of a student without a disability.

Grades

Grading scale includes the grades: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction

To be awarded a grade of Pass on the whole course, the student must have been awarded this grade on both modules. For a grade of Pass with Distinction on the whole course, the student must also have been awarded this grade on one of the modules (7.5 credits).

Entry requirements

To be admitted to the course, students must have passed ENGA22 or possess equivalent knowledge (acquired for example via ENGH11, ENGH12, ENGH13 and ENGH14).

Further information

1. The course is offered at the Centre for Languages and Literature, Lund University.
2. The modules on this course are identical with two of the modules included in English: Level 3, 61-90 credits. This is a part-time (50%) course that is taught throughout the semester and together with the students on the course English: Level 3, 61-90 credits.
3. The number of credits allocated for course content that is shared in whole or in part with another course can only be credited once for a degree. For further details, see current registration and information materials.
