ENGK60, English: Degree Project in English Language and Linguistics, 15 credits

Engelska: Examensarbete i engelsk språkvetenskap, 15 högskolepoäng First Cycle / Grundnivå

Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by The pro-dean for First-Cycle Studies at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology on 2021-09-14 to be valid from 2021-09-14, spring semester 2022.

General Information

The course is part of the Bachelor of Arts programme in English Studies, semester 6. It can normally be included in a first or second cycle degree.

Prior to semester 6, students in the Bachelor of Arts programme in English Studies choose a specialisation in either linguistics or literature. The students who choose the specialisation in linguistics take this course.

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, the students shall be able to

Knowledge and understanding

• provide an advanced account of a chosen area of English linguistics

Competence and skills

- carry out a study of linguistic data using linguistic concepts and methods
- independently identify, formulate and discuss linguistic issues
- use their time to ensure assignments are submitted within predetermined time frames
- independently search for and use information on English linguistics in libraries and databases
- discuss and present their own research and that of others in a way that is adapted to the situation and audience
- communicate in writing in correct and idiomatic academic English
- apply correct reference and citation techniques as they are used in linguistic texts

Judgement and approach

- critically review and evaluate different types of sources
- discuss the role of English language in society and the responsibility of individuals and organisations for how it is used
- evaluate how appropriate a particular theory, method or linguistic data is for the chosen area
- identify their need for further knowledge to improve their skills in English

Course content

The skills and knowledge acquired during previous and parallel courses are applied to a degree project in which the student also improves their ability to use English in speech and in writing. To support the work on the degree project, there is a series of seminars at which primarily linguistic methodology and academic writing, of relevance to the degree project, are presented and discussed (for example data collection, the link between research questions and appropriate empirical data, how to present an argument based on data, text structure, use of sources, how to write an abstract and how to prepare for the public defence seminar). At these seminars, students also have the opportunity to present their projects, discuss common issues at different stages of the process and to help each other progress.

Course design

The teaching consists of seminars and supervision of the degree project, individually or in groups. The supervision is limited to the semester in which the student first registered on the course, unless there are special reasons to the contrary. Attendance is compulsory at the public defence seminar.

Assessment

Assessment of the course is based on:

an individual degree project presented in the form of an academic paper of approximately 8000 words. The degree project is to be discussed and defended at a final seminar. This seminar is part of the assessment of the degree project.

Passed degree projects at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology can be registered in the LUP Student Papers database if the student so wishes. The student is responsible for uploading the passed degree project as a PDF file in LUP student papers.

The examiner, in consultation with Disability Support Services, may deviate from the regular form of examination in order to provide a permanently disabled student with a form of examination equivalent to that of a student without a disability.

Grades

Marking scale: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction.

To be awarded a grade of Pass on the whole course, the student must have been awarded this grade on the degree project. To be awarded a grade of Pass with Distinction on the whole course, the student must must have been awarded this grade on the degree project.

Entry requirements

To be admitted to the course, students must have successfully completed 125 credits in the Bachelor of Arts programme in English Studies at Lund University (or the equivalent), of which at least 75 credits must be in English.

- 1. The course is offered at the Centre for Languages and Literature, Lund University.
- 2. This course is identical to and are studied with the equivalent module and specialisation in ENGK03 and ENGK06.
- 3. The credits allocated for course content that in whole or in part is commensurate with another course can only be credited once for a degree.
