Details of approval

General Information

Subject: European Studies

The course is an optional component of the Master of Arts programme in European Studies. The course can normally be included as part of a second-cycle degree.

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course the student shall

Knowledge and understanding

- be able to demonstrate in-depth knowledge of and explain how skills in European Studies can be used to provide perspectives and approaches in professional life
- be able to explain how European Studies with a humanities orientation can be used in aspects of organisation and communication at a workplace
- be able to explain and provide perspectives on previous training in European Studies in an in-depth manner.

Competence and skills

- be able to formulate a problem of relevance for European Studies and actively select and use relevant tools to solve the problem
- be able to initiate and complete a sophisticated investigation of a selected problem area with a high degree of independence
- be able to use relevant theories and methods of the problem area investigated
- be able to efficiently compile and communicate in writing the results of a selected inquiry within a predetermined time frame and scope
- be able to analyse basic organisational and communication problems in professional life with the help of theoretical tools acquired in previous training in European Studies.

Judgement and approach

- be able to search for, evaluate, analyse and critically review information with a high degree of independence
- be able to judge what theories and methods are relevant for approaching the problem area investigated in the inquiry and justify their validity
- be able to judge how skills acquired in previous humanities studies can be used creatively in organisational and communication practice
- be able to reflect on and take responsibility for his or her own work and learning process.

Course content

The course consists of a work placement at an agency, organisation or company in Europe. The student is to work full-time for at least 18 weeks on an inquiry and participate in the everyday activities at the workplace, assisted by a supervisor. The work duties and inquiry are to be connected to the previous training in European Studies and the student shall gain experience of how knowledge of cultural and political situations in present-day Europe is used in real-life situations at a workplace during the placement.

Course design

The course consists of a full-time work placement for at least 18 weeks at an agency, organisation or company in Europe.

Assessment

On completion of the work placement, the student is to submit an in-depth written report presenting and analysing the problem area addressed by the student and the experiences of the placement. In addition to the report, the supervisor is to submit a certificate stating the personal details of the student, the principal duties assigned to the student, the duration and scope of the placement, and the nature of the inquiry produced by the student during his or her placement. For a grade of Pass, the student must also submit an evaluation.

Subcourses that are part of this course can be found in an appendix at the end of this document.

Grades

Marking scale: Fail, Pass. As no conventional exam is included in the examination, no other grades are awarded.

Entry requirements

To be admitted to the course, students must have been admitted to the Master's programme in European Studies and passed the courses EUHR11, EUHR12 and EUHR15 or acquired equivalent knowledge in some other way.

Further information

- 1. It is the responsibility of the student to arrange a suitable work placement and finance travel, accommodation, etc. The programme coordinator must approve the work placement, the supervisor and principal duties before the placement studies can be commenced.
- 2. The credits allocated for course content that in whole or in part is commensurate with another course can only be credited once for a degree. For further details see the current registration information and other relevant documentation.
- 3. The course is offered at the Centre for Languages and Literature, Lund University.
