

FPRA12, Practical Philosophy: Level 1, 30 credits

Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by the programmes director by delegation from the pro-dean for first- and second-cycle studies on 2014-09-01 and was last revised by The Pro Dean of First and Second Cycle Studies at The Joint Faculties of Humanities and Theology on 2024-03-14 (U 2024/167). The revised syllabus comes into effect 2024-03-14 and is valid from the autumn semester 2024.

General information

The course is offered as a freestanding course. It can normally be included in a first or second cycle degree.

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, the students shall be able to

Knowledge and understanding

- give an account of some issues, method problems, theories, concepts and positions in moral philosophy including applied ethics, political philosophy, aesthetics and philosophy of religion
- describe in general terms important historical and contemporary philosophers whose work and thinking have importance for how practical philosophy is carried out today
- describe at a general level and give an account of the important positions in practical philosophy's main fields of study: moral philosophy including applied ethics, political philosophy, aesthetics and philosophy of religion.

Competence and skills

- employ some of the methods of practical philosophy in written presentations
- use the analytical tools of practical philosophy to analyse certain positions and theorisings in the main fields of study of practical philosophy i.e. moral philosophy including applied ethics, political philosophy, aesthetics and philosophy of religion
- demonstrate a basic ability to take a position on and discuss their own and others' positions with regard to issues of right, wrong, vice and virtue

Judgement and approach

- use the analytical tools of practical philosophy to make assessments concerning present day problems
- critically reflect on norms and values in relation to humans' role in the world.

Course content

The course introduces the student to the problems and methods of practical philosophy. Questions about the position of values and actions, on both individual and community level, are central. The theories of contemporary and older philosophers are presented and analysed. Philosophic views are applied on moral, political, aesthetic and religious conceptions. The entire course highlights methods of argumentation and critical thinking in relation to the different philosophical issues.

The course consists of the following five modules:

1. Introduction and the History of Moral Philosophy, 7.5 credits
2. Critical Thinking and Applied Ethics, 6 credits
3. Moral Philosophy, 7.5 credits
4. Political Philosophy, 4.5 credits
5. Philosophy of Religion and Aesthetics, 4.5 credits

Course design

The teaching consists of lectures and group exercises. Module 5 includes one obligatory seminar.

The University is responsible for ensuring that an alternative date or comparable assignment is offered to students who are not able to complete a compulsory component owing to circumstances beyond their control, e.g. accident, sudden illness or similar situation. This also applies to students who miss teaching sessions owing to activities in an elected position as student representative.

Assessment

Module 1: Assessment through an invigilated written exam

Module 2: Assessment through 2 compulsory written assignments and an invigilated written exam. The grade is determined by the an invigilated written exam, but a passing grade all assignments is needed for a passing grade in the module.

Module 3: Assessment through an invigilated written exam

Module 4: Assessment through an invigilated written exam

Module 5: Assessment through an exam with an oral and a written (take-home) component. A passing grade on the oral component is a prerequisite for being allowed to submit the written component.

The examiner, in consultation with Disability Support Services, may deviate from the regular form of examination in order to provide a permanently disabled student with a form of examination equivalent to that of a student without a disability.

Grades

Grading scale includes the grades: U=Fail, E=Sufficient, D=Satisfactory, C=Good, B=Very Good, A=Excellent

The grade on the course as a whole is calculated in accordance with the following method:

- (1) Each letter grade corresponds to a number. 5 for A, 4 for B, 3 for C, 2 for D, 1 for E and 0 for Fail.
- (2) The number grade for each module is multiplied by the number of credits in the module.
- (3) The products are added up and the sum is divided by 30 (= the total number of credits for the whole course)
- (4) The resulting weighted average determines the grade on the whole course. $x=4.50-5.00$ gives the grade A; $x=3.50-4.49$ gives the grade B; $x=2.50-3.49$ gives the grade C; $x=1.50-2.49$ gives the grade D; $x=0-1.49$ gives the grade E.
- (5) To pass the course, students must have been awarded at least the grade of E on all course modules.

Further information

1. The course is offered by the Department of Philosophy, Lund University.
2. This course replaces FPRA11.
3. The course is partly identical to the level 1 course in Practical Philosophy (FPPA01) in the Bachelor's programme Practical Philosophy, Politics and Economics.
4. The credits allocated for course content that in whole or in part is commensurate with another course can only be credited once for a degree.
