General Information

Subject: History of Ideas and Sciences.

On completion of the course, the students shall be able to

Knowledge and understanding

- account for a number of notions/ideas trying to predict the future
- identify agents, thinkers, works (fiction, research, popular culture etc) and social movements of significance to the utopian and dystopian tradition and relate them to contemporary political and social circumstances
- distinguish between and account for types of utopias and dystopias from different historical eras
- account for a number of important theoretical approaches to utopias and dystopias

Competence and skills

- critically analyse selected utopian/dystopian works and practices of relevance and situate them historically
- reflect in writing on when and where utopian ideas arise in society

Judgement and approach

• analyse the meaning of utopian/dystopian ideas, and assess them in relation to social, ethnic and gender studies aspects

Course content

The aim of the course is to highlight and analyse ideas about the future from Antiquity and onwards. Among the topics discussed are scientific and religious claims of knowledge about the future, political visions, popular culture images, practices and the impact of technological development on utopian ideas. Emphasis is placed on the modern development of utopias and dystopias and the question: Where is humanity headed?

Course design

The teaching consists of lectures. The total number of teaching sessions is approximately 7.

Assessment

The assessment is based on an individual written assignment. There are three examinations in total.

Grades

Marking scale: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction.

The grades awarded are Fail, Pass and Pass with Distinction.
