Details of approval

Knowledge and understanding

- account for and reflect on analytical concepts relevant to environmental history,
- account for and reflect on environmental history as a field in relation to environmental humanities and environmental issues,

Competence and skills

- analyze environmental issues from a historical point of view,
- discuss contributions from environmental history in relation to environmental humanities, environmental debates, and other related areas,

Judgement and approach

• assess the merits of historical approaches to environmental issues

Course content

The course introduces the research field of environmental history. It focuses on the merits of historical approaches in relation to contemporary environmental issues and the wider research field of environmental humanities. Thereby, the course discusses examples of environmental history research to analyze contemporary challenges like air pollution, climate change, and loss of biological diversity. Additionally, it discusses environmental history research to analyze the development of "environment," "sustainability," "Anthropocene," and other key-concepts in the environmental debate.

Course design

The teaching consists of lectures and 2–3 seminars. The seminars are compulsory.

Absence from one of the compulsory seminars can be compensated for by a written assignment.

Assessment

The assessment of the course is based on a take-home exam.

The examiner, in consultation with Disability Support Services, may deviate from the regular form of examination in order to provide a permanently disabled student with a form of examination equivalent to that of a student without a disability.

Grades

Grading scale includes the grades: Fail, Pass For a grade of Pass on the whole course, the student must have been awarded this grade on the take-home exam.
