LATB51, Latin: Beginners' Course I, 15 credits Latin: Nybörjarkurs I, 15 högskolepoäng First Cycle / Grundnivå

Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by The pro-dean for First-Cycle Studies at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology on 2023-11-27 (U 2023/931). The syllabus comes into effect 2024-01-01 and is valid from the spring semester 2024.

General information

The course is offered as a freestanding course. It can normally be included in a general qualification for both first and second-cycle studies.

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, students shall be able to

Knowledge and understanding

- demonstrate knowledge of so much Latin grammar that is needed to translate simple texts from Latin
- provide a general account of parts of the culture that used Latin as a medium for two thousand years

Competence and skills

- apply basic parts of Latin grammar for translation of simple texts from Latin
- apply the stress rules of Latin when reading Latin texts

Judgement and approach

- discern and evaluate the significance of Latin in loan words and modern languages
- identify their need of further knowledge

Course content

The course provides students with elementary knowledge of Latin morphology, syntax and vocabulary, and the ability to interpret simple texts in Latin. Furthermore, it provides an orientation in the culture that used the language as a medium for two thousand years.

Course design

Teaching consists of interactive lectures and online group exercises. The course is also to a large extent based on the student working independently with pre-recorded lectures, texts and exercises. The course makes use of an online learning platform. Students are required to participate on this basis and to have access to a computer with an internet connection a web camera. The department will provide information about technical requirements.

Unless there are special circumstances, students must attend at least 50% of the interactive lectures. Absence can be compensated for with oral presentations. this opportunity is offered to students who have been unable to participate in compulsory components due to circumstances out of their control such as accidents, sudden illness or similar. This also applies to students who have missed teaching sessions because of duties as an elected student representative.

In addition, the following components are compulsory:

8 written assignments

Assessment

The assessment is based on 1 digitally invigilated written exam

Camera monitoring takes place in real time. No recording takes place. Live monitoring is required in order to assess the student's knowledge without the student having access to any aids.

The examiner, in consultation with Disability Support Services, may deviate from the regular form of examination in order to provide a permanently disabled student with a form of examination equivalent to that of a student without a disability.
