

## MGRD01, Modern Greek: Beginners' Course I, 15 credits

*Modern grekiska: Nybörjarkurs I, 15 högskolepoäng*

First Cycle / Grundnivå

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### Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by The Pro Dean of First and Second Cycle Studies at The Joint Faculties of Humanities and Theology on 2025-02-05 (U 2024/904). The syllabus comes into effect 2025-02-06 and is valid from the autumn semester 2025.

### General information

The course is offered as a stand-alone course. It can normally be included in a general qualification for both first and second-cycle studies.

### Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, the students shall be able to:

#### Knowledge and understanding

- master modern Greek and general grammar to the extent required to understand simple texts and conversations in modern Greek

#### Competence and skills

- communicate in everyday speech and writing in modern Greek in certain arranged situations
- master a basic vocabulary consisting of the most frequent words in modern Greek
- apply basic elements of modern Greek grammar

- use grammar books and bilingual dictionaries in order to read and write modern Greek

## **Judgement and approach**

- identify their need for further knowledge and skills in the subject.

## **Course content**

The course is a beginner's course in modern Greek and includes written and oral language proficiency with a focus on phonetics, grammar, morphology and syntax.

The course consists of the following modules:

1. The Greek Alphabet, 1.5 credits
2. Introduction to Modern Greek, 6 credits
3. Oral and Written Proficiency, 7.5 credits

## **Course design**

Teaching consists of online lectures and group work through interactive digital learning platforms. Students are required to participate on this basis and to have access to a computer with an internet connection and a web camera. The department will provide information about the technical requirements.

During the first two weeks of the course, an introductory module is provided, concluding with an online written exam in the third week. An additional four exam opportunities will be offered during the same week for participants who do not achieve a passing result on the initial attempt. A passing result on this exam is a requirement for completing the course.

Unless there are special circumstances, students must attend at least 50% of the lectures and group exercises.

Absence may be compensated by written assignments and oral reports; this opportunity is offered to students who have been unable to participate in compulsory components due to circumstances out of their control such as accidents, sudden illness or similar. This also applies to students who have missed teaching sessions because of duties as an elected student representative. There are otherwise no opportunities to compensate for compulsory components.

## **Assessment**

Assessment of the course is based on:

Module 1: 1 written self-correcting gatekeeping test

Module 2: 1 digitally invigilated written exam.

Module 3: 1 digitally invigilated written exam and 1 oral exam.

Camera monitoring takes place in real time. No recording takes place. Live monitoring is required in order to assess the student's knowledge without the student having access to any aids.

The examiner, in consultation with Disability Support Services, may deviate from the regular form of examination in order to provide a permanently disabled student with a form of examination equivalent to that of a student without a disability.

## Grades

Grading scale includes the grades: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction

For the grade of Pass on the whole course, the student must have been awarded this grade on all modules. For a grade of Pass with Distinction on the whole course, the student must have been awarded this grade on at least 7.5 credits and at least a grade of Pass on the remaining credits.

- The course replaces NYGB01.
