MGRD02, Modern Greek: Beginners' Course II, 15 credits Modern grekiska: Nybörjarkurs II, 15 högskolepoäng First Cycle / Grundnivå

Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by The Pro Dean of First and Second Cycle Studies at The Joint Faculties of Humanities and Theology on 2025-02-05 (U 2024/905). The syllabus comes into effect 2025-02-06 and is valid from the autumn semester 2025.

General information

The course is offered as a stand-alone course. It can normally be included in a general qualification for both first and second-cycle studies.

Language of instruction: Swedish and Greek (modern)

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, the students shall be able to:

Knowledge and understanding

- give an account of selected parts of modern Greek literature in translation,
- provide an overview of Greek history and language history, as well as of contemporary Greek society and culture,

Competence and skills

- be able to analyze and present selected aspects of Modern Greek literature and literary history,
- be able to describe the main content of some Modern Greek literary works and their authors,

- be able to describe significant events in contemporary Greek history,
- be able to describe Greek history from a diachronic perspective and understand its impact on Greek society,
- be able to understand and explain aspects of contemporary Greek society and Greek culture,

Judgement and approach

- identify their need for further knowledge and skills in the subject
- compare certain traditions and circumstances in Greek society with those of Sweden.

Course content

The course is a beginners' course within Modern Greek and is offered online at a rate of 50% of full-time study. It focuses on the literature, history, society and culture of Greece.

The course consists of the following modules:

- 1. Modern Greek Literature, 7,5 credits
- 2. Modern Greek History, Society and Culture, 7,5 credits

Course design

Teaching consists of online lectures and group work through interactive digital learning platforms. Students are required to participate on this basis and to have access to a computer with an internet connection a web camera. The department will provide information about the technical requirements.

Unless there are special circumstances, students must attend at least 50% of the lectures and group exercises. Absence may be compensated by written assignments and oral reports; this opportunity is offered to students who have been unable to participate in compulsory components due to circumstances out of their control such as accidents, sudden illness or similar. This also applies to students who have missed teaching sessions because of duties as an elected student representative. There are otherwise no opportunities to compensate for compulsory components.

Assessment

The assessment is based on

Module 1: 1 digitally invigilated written exam

Module 2: 1 digitally invigilated written exam and 1 digital oral seminar

Camera monitoring takes place in real time. No recording takes place. Live monitoring is required in order to assess the student's knowledge without the student having access to any aids.

The examiner, in consultation with Disability Support Services, may deviate from the regular form of examination in order to provide a permanently disabled student with a form of examination equivalent to that of a student without a disability.

Grades

Grading scale includes the grades: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction For the grade of Pass on the whole course, the student must have been awarded this grade on all modules. For a grade of Pass with Distinction on the whole course, the student must have been awarded this grade on at least 10 credits and at least a grade of Pass on the remaining credits.
