MGRK01, Modern Greek: B.A. Course - Level 3, 30 credits Modern grekiska: Kandidatkurs, 30 högskolepoäng First Cycle / Grundnivå

Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by The Pro Dean of First and Second Cycle Studies at The Joint Faculties of Humanities and Theology on 2025-02-05 (U 2024/909). The syllabus comes into effect 2025-02-10 and is valid from the autumn semester 2025.

General information

The course is offered as a stand-alone course. It can normally be included in a general qualification for both first and second-cycle studies.

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, the students shall be able to:

Knowledge and understanding

- give an account of the disciplinary foundation for the subject Modern Greek
- give an account of some applicable research methods in Modern Greek
- in their subject area orient themselves and give an account of current research questions
- give an account of the Modern Greek language from synchronous and diachronic perspectives using a specialised approach

Competence and skills

- give an account of and discuss information, problems and solutions in dialogue with a group regardless of whether the group is subject oriented or not, orally and in writing
- search for, compile and review information from different sources within the field of the degree project
- reproduce Modern Greek texts with a great deal of content-based and linguistic variation, in speech and writing
- understand and reproduce the content of different variations of Modern Greek spoken language
- formulate, resolve and report on a research assignment within a predetermined time frame in the subject Modern Greek
- apply some basic scholarly concepts in order to analyse material e.g. literary texts or linguistic data
- apply the formalities of scientific writing within the subject Modern Greek

Judgement and approach

- relate to relevant scientific, societal and ethical aspects in the subject Modern Greek
- discuss the role of knowledge in society and the responsibility of individuals for how it is used
- identify their need for further knowledge and learning development.

Course content

The course provides advanced knowledge on Modern Greek language and literature as well as increased familiarity with linguistic and literary theories, methods and issues. Reports and discussions during the course are in Swedish or English and, when applicable, in Greek. The course includes a degree project written in Swedish or English or, if agreed with the supervisor, in Greek. The degree project is discussed at a seminar.

The course consists of the following modules:

- 1. Modern Greek Linguistics and Language Variation, 5 credits,
- 2. Text and Literature, 5 credits,
- 3. Theory and Method, 5 credits,
- 4. Degree Project, 15 credits.

Course design

Teaching consists of lectures, seminars and supervision. Assessed seminars (approximately 3) and 3 supervision sessions are compulsory. The choice of subject for the degree project is to be discussed with and approved by the supervisor.

Supervision including examination is limited to 20 hours per degree project and student. Supervision is primarily limited to the semester the student starts the level 3 course and may at most be extended to the next semester.

The course is offered online. The students are expected to participate based on the conditions that apply to the course session in question, and to have access to a computer with an internet connection and a web camera. The department will provide information about the technical requirements.

Assessment

Module 1 is assessed based on 1 written assignment and 1 oral presentation.

Module 2 is assessed based on 1 oral exam.

Module 3 is assessed based on 1 written assignment.

Module 4 is assessed based on the student's presentation of their independent degree project at a seminar and their critical review of a fellow student's degree project. The number of degree project submissions is limited to five. Any completions are to be submitted within two weeks of the examiner delivering feedback on the degree project. Late submission may influence the grade.

Depending on what was stated in the course announcement, all modules may be assessed on campus or online with camera supervision. The department provides information on what applies to each course session.

It is recommended that degree projects awarded a grade of Pass at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology be registered in the LUP Student Papers database. The student is responsible for ensuring that the version of the degree project that has been assessed and approved is the one uploaded to LUP Student Papers (in PDF format).

The examiner, in consultation with Disability Support Services, may deviate from the regular form of examination in order to provide a permanently disabled student with a form of examination equivalent to that of a student without a disability.

Grades

Grading scale includes the grades: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction For the grade of Pass on the whole course, the student must have been awarded this grade on all modules. For a grade of Pass with Distinction on the whole course, the student must have been awarded this grade on at least 20 credits and a grade of Pass on the remaining credits.

Entry requirements

To be admitted to the course, students must have passed MGRD04 or the equivalent.
