MRSB02, Human Rights Studies: Human Rights and Religion, 7.5 credits

Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by The pro-dean for First-Cycle Studies at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology on 2020-09-07 to be valid from 2021-01-01, spring semester 2021.

General Information

The course is offered as a freestanding course and can be included in a first or second cycle degree.

Language of instruction: Swedish

Main field of studies

Depth of study relative to the degree requirements G1N, First cycle, has only upper-secondary level entry requirements

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, the students shall be able to

Knowledge and understanding

- describe and provide concrete examples of issues in which human rights and religion come into conflict
- account for current interpretations of human rights based on different religions

Competence and skills

- discuss religion and human rights from scholarly perspectives
- discuss legal issues in a complex social context

Judgement and approach

- critically assess strengths and weaknesses in arguments and different positions in current debates on human rights and religion
- relate to and reflect on the importance of religious contexts for the realisation of human rights

Course content

Human rights are based on an ideology that is often considered incompatible with religious perspectives. The course covers issues in which human rights and contemporary religion come into conflict, the collision between individual and collective rights. The course presents a multidisciplinary overview of and introduction to human rights and religion based on current debates. Students discuss perspectives on human rights and religion with a focus on concepts, values and applications to real challenges of the present day. What carries more weight, religious freedom or human rights? During the course, students discuss rights and obligations in relation to religion and ethics, structures that characterise religions in general and human rights in a complex social context.

Course design

Teaching consists of lectures and 2-4 seminars. Seminars are compulsory. Absence from a compulsory component is to be compensated for with an assignment in accordance with the instructions of the lecturer.

Assessment

Assessment of the course is based on 1-2 written assignments and 1-2 oral seminar presentations.

The examiner, in consultation with Disability Support Services, may deviate from the regular form of examination in order to provide a permanently disabled student with a form of examination equivalent to that of a student without a disability.

Grades

Marking scale: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction.

For a grade of Pass on the whole course, the student must have been awarded this grade for all assessed components. For a grade of Pass with Distinction on the whole course, the student must have been awarded this grade for all assessed course components.
