# NYGM01, Modern Greek: Level 4 - Mag. Course, 30 credits Nygrekiska: Magisterkurs, 30 högskolepoäng Second Cycle / Avancerad nivå

## Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by the programmes director by delegation from the prodean for first- and second-cycle studies on 2007-05-23 to be valid from 2007-05-23, autumn semester 2007.

# **General Information**

The course is offered as a single course. It can normally be included as part of a general degree at the undergraduate or graduate levels.

Language of instruction: Swedish and Modern Greek

### Learning outcomes

On completion of the course the student shall

#### Knowledge and understanding

- be able to demonstrate broad knowledge of modern Greek literature and literary history, from the time of the Byzantine Empire to the present day and be able to discuss this literature from various perspectives
- be able to demonstrate familiarity with linguistic theories, methods and approaches found within his/her chosen area of specialisation

#### Competence and skills

- be able to read and understand modern Greek texts, also from early periods, which vary greatly in content and language, and be able to follow and understand spoken modern Greek of varying character
- be able to assess, summarise and evaluate information from various sources
- be able to formulate, resolve and report research findings from his/her chosen area of specialisation within either modern Greek linguistics, literature or cultural studies within a given timeframe, autonomously and using suitable scholarly terminology

#### Judgement and approach

- be able to discuss and evaluate the place of linguistics, literary studies and cultural studies in the academic world
- demonstrate a sound ability in self-evaluation and be able to assess what is involved in the roles of cultural encounters, various ethnicities and gender
- be able to relate to a general humanist tradition of learning.

#### Course content

The course provides the students with in-depth knowledge and understanding of both early and contemporary modern Greek language and literature and also an increased familiarity with the theories, methods and approaches of literary and cultural studies. The course includes writing a degree project which is then discussed and defended at a seminar. Oral and written language proficiency is practiced throughout the course.

The course consists of the following sub-courses:

- 1. Literature, 15 credits,
- 2. Degree Project, 15 credits.

## Course design

Teaching consists of lectures, tutoring, seminars and group exercises.

### Assessment

The following examination forms may occur: written tests, oral tests and submitted assignments. In addition, a seminar is held in which the student's own degree thesis is discussed as is that of another student. Performance in this seminar contributes to the final grade.

Passed degree projects at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology can be registered in the LUP Student Papers database if the student so wishes. The student is responsible for uploading the passed degree project as a PDF file in LUP student papers.

## Grades

Marking scale: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction.

To be awarded a Pass on the whole course the student shall have the grade of Pass on all sub-courses. To be awarded the grade of Pass with Distinction on the whole course the student shall have the grade of Pass with Distinction on at least 15 of the credits on the course and a grade of Pass on the remaining credits.

### Entry requirements

To be eligible for the course requires the successful completion of NYGK01, or the equivalent.
