RBVB13, Religious Behavioural Science: Level 2, 15 credits

Details of approval

The syllabus is an old version, approved by the pro-dean for first-cycle studies at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology on 2016-01-12 and was last revised on 2016-06-15. The revised syllabus applied from 2017-01-16. , spring semester 2017.

General Information

The course is offered as a freestanding course. It can be selected as a specialisation course in the Bachelor's programme in Religious Studies and Theology. It may be included in a first or second cycle degree.

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, students shall be able to

Knowledge and understanding

- account for the historical development of the sociology of religion and the key theories and methods of the discipline
- account for previous research of a delimited issue within religious behavioural science
- discuss the difference between primary sources, previous research and handbooks, study resources and other types of material

• explain the characteristics of an academic paper in contrast to other genres/text types, such as journalistic features or opinion pieces

Competence and skills

- with a certain degree of independence use theories of the sociology of religion to analyse present-day social phenomena
- produce a minor academic paper on a predetermined issue in correct Swedish and in accordance with established formal standards
- select and assess published research of relevance to the paper

Judgement and approach

- take a critical position on perspectives, theories and methods of the sociology of religion
- distinguish between scholarly and religious perspectives
- perceptively identify their need of further knowledge in the subject

Course content

The course starts with an introduction to the sociology of religion, focusing on its background and historical development. It addresses some key theories and sociological methods of the sociology of religion, including their development in relation to changes in society. The theories and methods are exemplified by means of current studies on contemporary social phenomena.

In the second half of the course, the students practise taking on an independent assignment that is to be presented in a minor paper. The aim of the course is to provide students with an introduction to and training in academic writing. Based on a predetermined problem area within religious behavioural science, the students write an academic papers individually or in pairs. The students are to present parts of their work that will be read and commented on by other students on the course. The course is concluded by a compulsory seminar in which the students critically review the paper of a fellow student and defends their own paper.

The course consists of the following modules:

- 1. Introduction to the Sociology of Religion, 7.5 credits
- 2. Essay, 7.5 credits

Course design

The teaching consists of lectures and seminars. The final defence seminar is compulsory.

Assessment

The assessment of module 1 is based on a take-home exam.

The assessment of module 2 is based on a minor paper of approximately 40 000 characters with spaces, including a cover sheet, table of contents and bibliography, and a final defence seminar.

Grades

Marking scale: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction.

For a grade of Pass on the whole course, the student must have been awarded this grade on both modules. For a grade of Pass with Distinction on the whole course, the student must have been awarded this grade on both modules.

Entry requirements

To be admitted to the course, the student must have passed Religious Studies and Theology: Level 1 (CTRA12/CTRD12/CTRA11/CTRD01) **or** History of Religions: Level 1 (RHIA12/RHIA11) **or** Islamic Studies: Level 1 (ISLA11) **or** Jewish Studies: Level 1 (JUDA11) **or** 30 credits in sociology **or** the equivalent.
