RYSD14, Russian: Russian Literature after the Fall of the Soviet Union, 7.5 credits

Ryska: Den ryska litteraturen efter Sovjetunionens fall, 7,5 högskolepoäng First Cycle / Grundnivå

Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by The pro-dean for First-Cycle Studies at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology on 2017-10-09 and was last revised on 2019-10-08. The revised syllabus applies from 2020-01-01, spring semester 2020.

General Information

Subject: Russian

The course is offered as a freestanding course. It can normally be included in a first or second cycle degree.

Language of instruction: Swedish

Main field of studies

Depth of study relative to the degree requirements G1N, First cycle, has only upper-secondary level entry requirements

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, the students shall be able to

Knowledge and understanding

- account for the role of literature and, partly, film for the creation of memory and identity in post-Soviet Russia
- discuss the literary works studied in the course with regard to present-day currents of ideas and in the light of Russia's historically complex relationship to the West

Competence and skills

- apply their knowledge of post-Soviet currents of ideas, including the issue of memory and identity, to the analysis of at least six post-Soviet novels and at least one post-Soviet film
- analyse in speech and writing the texts studied in the course by applying the theories and methods addressed during the course

Judgement and approach

- scrutinise the specific values of post-Soviet literature in relation to a general humanistic approach
- take a position based on a personal set of values on different interpretations of post-Soviet literature

Course content

The course provides students with basic knowledge of Russian literature from the fall of the Soviet Union in 1991 to the present, partly in relation to Russian contemporary film, but also of the prevailing cultural and social circumstances, focusing especially on memory and identity, in post-Soviet Russia. Students are also introduced to different theories of interpretation and, by regular practice of analytical skills on primarily literature but also film, they acquire specialised knowledge of post-Soviet literature and the most prominent currents of ideas during this period.

Course design

The teaching consists of lectures and seminars (of which 4-6 is compulsory). The course is offered as a distance learning course and makes use of interactive information technology. Students are required to participate under these conditions, and to have access to a computer with an internet connection. The department will provide information about the technical requirements.

Assessment

The assessment is based on 4-6 written assignments, 4-6 peer review assignments and a take-home exam.

The examiner, in consultation with Disability Support Services, may deviate from the regular form of examination in order to provide a permanently disabled student with a form of examination equivalent to that of a student without a disability.

Grades

Marking scale: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction.

For a grade of Pass on the whole course, the student must have been awarded this grade for all assessed components. For a grade of Pass with Distinction on the whole course, the student must have been awarded this grade for all assessed components.

Entry requirements

General requirements and studies equivalent of the courses History 1b or 1a1+1a2 and Social Studies 1b or 1a1+1a2 from Swedish Upper Secondary School.
