Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by the programmes director by delegation from the prodean for first- and second-cycle studies on 2012-07-02 and was last revised on 2025-09-08 by The Pro Dean of First and Second Cycle Studies at The Joint Faculties of Humanities and Theology (U 2025/344). The revised syllabus comes into effect 2025-09-11 and is valid from the autumn semester 2026.

Subject: Media History

The course is offered as a free-standing course. It can normally be included as part of a first- or second-cycle degree.

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course the student shall

Knowledge and understanding

- be able to give a basic account of the different types of relationship between the media and armed conflict, in history as well as in the present
- be able to account for basic knowledge of the development of the relationships between the media and armed conflict and be able to relate these to medial as well as cultural, social and technical change

Competence and skills

- be able to identify and formulate issues of the media with regard to armed conflict
- be able to analyse and critically discuss media expressions, orally and in writing
- be able to discern relevant contexts of medial as well as cultural, social and technical conditions and change for the relationship between media and armed conflict

Judgement and approach

• be able to assess media critically while taking into account relevant scientific and social aspects.

Course content

The course focuses on the significance of media for armed conflicts and the significance of armed conflicts for the media, in historical as well as present-day perspectives. The aim of the course is to provide tools for analysing and understanding different cultural, social and technical aspects of the relationships between media and armed conflict.

Course design

Teaching consists of lectures combined with 2-4 seminar and group exercises. The seminars and group exercises are compulsory components which require preparation and active participation.

If students are unable to complete the compulsory component due to circumstances beyond their control, such as an accident, sudden illness, or similar, they may be given the opportunity to make up for it in accordance with the instructions provided by the responsible teacher. This also applies to students who are fulfilling duties as student representatives.

Assessment

Assessment is based on active attendance at the compulsory components and a written assignment at the end of the course.

In exceptional cases, a re-examination may be conducted as an oral examination under camera surveillance, supported by real-time streaming. The surveillance is carried out live and no recording is made. Real-time monitoring is required in order to assess the student's knowledge without access to unauthorised aids.

The examiner, in consultation with Disability Support Services, may deviate from the regular form of examination in order to provide a permanently disabled student with a form of examination equivalent to that of a student without a disability.

Grades

Grading scale includes the grades: U=Fail, E=Sufficient, D=Satisfactory, C=Good, B=Very Good, A=Excellent

The highest grade is A and the lowest passing grade is E. The grade for a non-passing result is Fail.
