Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by The Pro Dean of First and Second Cycle Studies at The Joint Faculties of Humanities and Theology on 2025-05-15 (U 2025/359). The syllabus comes into effect 2025-05-15 and is valid from the spring semester 2026.

General information

Subject: Ukrainian

The course is offered as a freestanding course. It can normally be included in a first or second-cycle degree.

Language of instruction: English The course is given in English and Ukrainian.

Main field of Specialisation study

G1F, First cycle, has less than 60 credits in first-cycle course/s as entry requirements

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, the student shall be able to

Knowledge and understanding

- identify and describe different stylistic variations in modern Ukrainian texts,
- explain grammatical structures in the texts,
- understand intermediate vocabulary in context,
- explain historical, social and cultural references in Ukrainian texts,

Competence and skills

- master reading comprehension of intermediate Ukrainian texts (both fiction and non-fiction),
- identify and analyse key vocabulary, collocations and idiomatic expressions in texts,
- apply Ukrainian grammatical structures in the context of text analysis and discussions,

Judgement and approach

- critically review, discuss and take a position on language norms, and adopt a scholarly approach to the language,
- develop critical thinking skills by participating in debates on text topics.

Course content

The course deepens the students' knowledge of Ukrainian vocabulary, grammar and stylistic variations through in-depth text analysis. Teaching focuses on practical exercises in reading comprehension, translation and discussion, with an emphasis on identifying stylistic differences in different text genres, analysing grammatical structures and interpreting vocabulary in context. Selected Ukrainian texts – both fiction and non-fiction – provide insights into both language structures and sociocultural contexts. The course further develops the students' ability to critically examine language norms, recognise cultural and historical references and apply linguistic analysis in discussions. Through debates and text-based exercises, the students develop their critical thinking and improve their language skills.

Course design

Teaching is in the form of lectures, seminars and 2-4 written assignments. Submission of all written assignments is compulsory. The opportunity to compensate for missed components takes the form of oral or written assessment.

Assessment

Assessment is based on one written take-home examination.

The examiner, in consultation with Disability Support Services, may deviate from the regular form of examination in order to provide a permanently disabled student with a form of examination equivalent to that of a student without a disability.

Grades

Grading scale includes the grades: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction For the grade of Pass on the course, the student must have been awarded this grade on the take-home examination. For the grade of Pass with Distinction on the course, the student must have been awarded this grade on the take-home examination.

Entry requirements

Ukrainian: Beginners' Course I and II (30 credits) and *Ukrainian Text Study I* (7.5 credits) or equivalent.
