Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by Faculty Board of Social Sciences on 2011-11-17 and was last revised on 2023-06-14 by the board of the Department of Political Science. The revised syllabus applies from 2023-08-28, autumn semester 2023.

General Information

The course is offered as a single subject course for the programme Master of Science (Two Years) in Welfare Policies and Management.

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, the student should demonstrate the ability to

Knowledge and understanding

- identify, understand and reflect on problems related to evaluation studies

Competence and skills

- critically assess the utility and appropriateness of diverse theories, methods and techniques in evaluation studies
- critically assess completed evaluation studies
- formulate relevant evaluation questions and design a scientifically based evaluation

study

- communicate scientific issues and follow the development of knowledge within the field evaluation and welfare management.

Course content

The aim of the course is to analyse different theories, models and methods of evaluation and to critically assess evaluation research and the use of evaluation results. This is an interdisciplinary course where theories and perspectives from social policy and social work, sociology, and political science contribute to give a wide-ranging understanding of evaluations within the field of welfare policies and management. The interdisciplinary approach is used throughout the course; hence, the main themes are problematised and reflected on from different theoretical perspectives and empirical examples.

Course design

Teaching is in the form of lectures and seminars. Students are expected to attend lectures and to participate actively in seminar discussions. The language of instruction is English; lectures and seminars are conducted in English, and examinations and students' course papers are written in English.

Assessment is based on:

- oral presentations and active participation in seminars
- an individually written paper

Assessment

The course offers a regular examination, a re-examination in close connection to the regular examination, and a third examination opportunity within the same academic year. Within one year of the course having undergone a major change or is discontinued, at least two additional examinations are offered on the same course content. Thereafter, the student is offered additional examinations but in accordance with the current syllabus.

The examiner, in consultation with Disability Support Services, may deviate from the regular form of examination in order to provide a permanently disabled student with a form of examination equivalent to that of a student without a disability.

Subcourses that are part of this course can be found in an appendix at the end of this document.

Grades

Marking scale: Fail, E, D, C, B, A.

The grades awarded are A, B, C, D, E or Fail. The highest grade is A and the lowest passing grade is E. The grade for a non-passing result is Fail.

The student's performance is assessed with reference to the learning outcomes of the course. For the grade of E the student must show acceptable results. For the grade of D the student must show satisfactory results. For the grade of C the student must

show good results. For the grade of B the student must show very good results. For the grade of A the student must show excellent results. For the grade of Fail the student must have shown unacceptable results.

At the start of the course students are informed about the learning outcomes stated in the syllabus and about the grading scale and how it is applied in the course.

Entry requirements

The course is offered to students admitted to the programme Master of Science (Two Years) in Welfare Policies and Management.
