YIDD22, Yiddish: Level 2 B, 15 credits Jiddisch: Fortsättningskurs II, 15 högskolepoäng First Cycle / Grundnivå

Details of approval

The syllabus was approved by The pro-dean for First-Cycle Studies at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology on 2023-06-14 to be valid from 2023-09-01, spring semester 2024.

General Information

The course is offered as a freestanding course.

Language of instruction: Swedish and English The course is given mostly in Yiddish. Some elements may be in Swedish or English.

Learning outcomes

On completion of the course, the students shall be able to:

Knowledge and understanding

- give an account of Yiddish literature in a cultural-historical context
- give an account of what characterises the different eras and the most significant authors and works in classical and modern fiction and drama in Yiddish
- give an account of the origin and development of modern Yiddish culture by using newspaper texts in Yiddish and other media
- account for and apply the terminology required for basic analysis of literary texts in Yiddish

Competence and skills

• analyse the subject matter of Yiddish fiction and non-fiction texts and argue for alternative interpretations

- identify and use relevant and reliable sources of information for the study of Yiddish and Yiddish literature
- design a basic analytical paper in the area of Yiddish language and literature

Judgement and approach

- compare, assess and argue for different analyses of Yiddish literature
- discuss explicit and implicit statements about class, gender and ethnicity in texts
- relate to the concept of "scientific approach" based on their area of specialisation.

Course content

In addition to the focus on Yiddish literary history, the student learns to improve their analysis of fiction texts. The course also introduces scientific methodology in the form of a paper. In the Level 2 course, students initiate the academic writing process through producing a written analysis of delimited Yiddish material. In the course, the basic aspects are presented in the writing of a short academic paper with either a linguistic or literary studies perspective.

The course consists of the following modules:

- 1. History of Yiddish Literature, 7.5 credits,
- 2. The Writing Process, 7.5 credits.

Course design

Teaching consists of lectures, group exercises and 3-5 compulsory seminars.

Compensation opportunities are offered in consultation with the course director.

When teaching is offered entirely as a distance learning course, this is conducted with the support of an online learning platform and digital tools. Students are required to participate on this basis and have access to a computer with an internet connection and a loudspeaker, microphone and web camera.

Assessment

Module 1 is assessed on the basis of three written assignments.

Module 2 is assessed on the basis of a paper that is publicly discussed at a seminar. A defence of the student's own paper is included in the examination, as well as a critical review.

The examiner, in consultation with Disability Support Services, may deviate from the regular form of examination in order to provide a permanently disabled student with a form of examination equivalent to that of a student without a disability.

Grades

Marking scale: Fail, Pass, Pass with distinction.

For the grade of Pass on the whole course, the student must have been awarded at least this grade on all modules. For the grade of Pass with Distinction on the whole course, the student must have been awarded this grade for all modules.

Entry requirements

To be admitted to the course, students must have completed Yiddish: Level 2 A , YIDD21, or equivalent.
